

Isle of Hope Fiddlernauts Headed to Nationals

In 2016, twenty Isle of Hope Students traveled to Richmond Hill Middle School to take a regional qualifying test for NASA's Student Astronaut Challenge. Ten students scored high enough to qualify Isle of Hope to send one team to the national competition at the Kennedy Space Center in February 2017.

Students would be expected to compete in four areas, a space shuttle Atlantis launch and landing simulation, a lab presentation (how to grow food on Mars), an engineering challenge, and a landing challenge. Twelve middle



Twelve middle school teams from Florida and Georgia competed for the top honors in all four challenges.

Isle of Hope, the only school representing Savannah Chatham Public Schools, and one of the three teams representing Georgia,

took ten students to the Finals. Fortunately, Bobcat of Savannah provided a majority of the resources allowing "Team Bobcat" to take part in this incredible opportunity.

The Habitat for Humanity Restore, located at 701 Martin Luther King Jr. Blvd in downtown Savannah, is operated by, and acts in support of, the mission of the Coastal Empire Habitat for Humanity which reads as follows "Seeking to put God's love into action, the Coastal Empire Habitat for Humanity brings people together to build homes, communities and hope". Established in 1983, the Coastal Empire Habitat for Humanity is Chatham County's premiere affordable homeownership program and has opened the doors thus far to 140 working families. Habitat for Humanity brings low-income working families together with volunteers



and donors to build safe, affordable and energy-efficient homes which are sold at no-interest and no-profit to these partner families.

International Space Center Commander Shane Kimbrough provided encouragement to the team in the form of emails from the ISS.

Over the three day competition, students competed in all four challenges. On the final day, IOH placed 4th in the landing challenge, 7th in the laboratory chal-lenge (with a perfect score on their research report), 11thin the Engineering Challenge. Isle of Hope placed 2nd in the nation, in the largest and most exciting challenge, the Launch

and Landing Challenge. They lost (in their first appearance) by 1/2 a point.

Two months ago, almost 70 students expressed interest in taking part in this year's Isle of Hope Astronaut Club. Coaches Carolyn Rethwisch (IOH Science Teacher), Wade Smith (IOH STEAM Teacher) and Dr. Barbara Serianni (Professor in the College of Ed at Armstrong University) worked with the students to prepare for this year's regional competition. It was held last Saturday, October 7, at Richmond Hill

Middle School.

This year, Isle of Hope had two teams qualify for the National Competition. Once again, they are the only school representing Savannah Chatham Public Schools and one of three schools representing Georgia.

Over the next few months, the teams will be looking to partner with members of the community as they increase their engineering and flying skills, and work to raise almost \$10,000. (continued on page 12)

5 Tips for an Efficient Everyday Homework

Whether your child is six or sixteen, homework is undoubtedly a part of their everyday life. Naturally, practice is a key component in learning, and homework provides an opportunity for students to apply the lessons they learn in class on their own, and flesh out their understanding at a pace that's comfortable for them. For students at any age, it's important to have a healthy homework strategy, making sure to absorb lessons as best they can and prepare relevant questions for when they're back in class.

As every parent knows,

getting your child to adhere to a homework

schedule can be met with eye rolls and discontented sighing. Here are five tips for getting your growing scholar on the right track to homework success.

1. Establish a set "working" space.

Having a defined homework area helps students focus on the task at hand—working in a quiet, comfortable space minimizes potential distractions from unfamiliar sights or sounds. Whether it's a bedroom desk or a chair at the kitchen table,

2. Break big projects into small pieces.

Projects like science experiments or research papers can sometimes be overwhelming if students try to complete them in one go. Showing your child the benefits of scheduling his or her time effectively and breaking out responsibilities over several days or weeks will not only make these projects more manageable, but it will also likely lead to higher grades—as there will be more time to review the work and make important adjustments.

3. Harness the power of technology—without the distraction.

Research shows that multitasking is rarely as efficient as people think. Needless to say, you should insist that all distracting electronics be put aside while homework is in progress (yes, even the phone!). But when it comes

to conducting in-depth research or looking up quick tips (e.g., on education sites), the internet can be a very positive asset. To make sure your child is staying on task, reinforce productive internet use by helping them sift through what they find.

4. Start with something easy to reinforce a positive attitude.

Each day, encourage your child to start with an assignment that seems easy. Maybe it will be the reading from your daughter's favorite class, or a couple of math problems that your son knows he can finish quickly. Whatever it is, the feeling of accomplishment and confidence that results from getting one thing out of the


way helps the homework session begin on a positive note so you can then move on to a stronger frame

of mind.

5. Know when to step back

With so much pressure to achieve exceptional academic results, it's easy to lose sight of the long-term effects of too much stress and pressure related to work. One of the most important things you can do for your child is give them the space they need to grow, and to give them a break when they need it so that their minds are open to learning (without too much focus on getting a good grade). By keeping "homework time" a safe space, you're giving your child the most important tools they need for success — support and care.

Coach Carolyn Rethwisch had this to say, "For the first time, our Title 1 school, will have just as many girls competing as boys. That is HUGE for STEM education. Just seeing the enthusiasm from our kids, the willingness to practice 12-15 hours a week, and raise close to \$10,000 to once again fly in the Space Shuttle Atlantis Simulator is exciting! These kids are world-changers and I couldn't be any prouder of their accomplishments."

Ten IOH Astronaut Club members showcased their talents at the Isle of Hope Music and Art Festival and will present at the Georgia State Technology Conference in Atlanta, GA. on November 8-9th. The Keynote Speaker is former astronaut, Leeland Melvin.


"The doors opening up for our students because of the competition is unbelievable," states Rethwisch. "Once again, our Fiddlernauts are proving worthy of our belief in them and stepping up to the challenges. They will continue working hard to prove they can compete against larger schools with actual simulators. Our kids use make-shift panels and donated computers, but they get the job done. They have passion and grit. They believe the astronaut motto that 'Failure is not

an Option.' For them, it is not. They will continue to compete their hearts out. What more could a coach ask for?"

more. This year we have already been able to


assist those in need of help through labor on Tybee Island with Hurricane Irma clean-up efforts!

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
