

Isle of Hope Art & Music Fest Returns with Most Participants Ever

The Isle of Hope Art and Music Fest returns Saturday, October 26. The Art Fest takes place at the Isle of Hope Marina Pavilion, Paxton Park, Rose Drive and Bluff Drive from 10:00 am to 5:00 pm (see pages 10,12,14 for the layout). According to Brigitte Van-Baelen, who spearheads the event, the Art and Music Fest has more participants than ever this year. Some IOH favorites plan to set up a booth, including Dale's Crab Traps, Kelli Mills Photography, Noel Wright Woodturning, Polly Cooper, and Frond and Fern.

The Music Fest starts at 10:00 am in the IOH Marina parking lot. The World Famous Crabettes kick off the live music (10 am), followed by Keith & Ross (11:30 am), The Eric Culberson Band (1 pm), Andrew Gill, and Company (3 pm), and Lyn Avenue (5 pm). Junkyard Angel finishes off the night with a set from 7 pm to 9 pm.

Chazitos Latin Cuisine, Dark Shark Taco Attack, Ben & Jerry's, Bayou Cafe, C&C Nut Factory, Kona Ice,



Big Cheese, Pie Society, Magic Food Truck, Prowl, and Little Diddle's Bakery will provide great food and treats. The Isle of Hope Marina and Paxton Park will sell beer, wine, soda, and water.

Mathnasium, BankSouth and other vendors will offer kids activities at the Isle of Hope Playground. You can bring dogs on a leash.

The Isle of Hope Artist Guild started The Isle of Hope Art and Music Fest more than 18 years ago. Residents and artists joined together for the first festival, which took place in front of Noel and Ruthie Wright's house on Bluff Drive.
