Honoring Ossabaw Island's Eleanor "Sandy" Torrey West (1913 – 2021)

Eleanor "Sandy" Torrey West, preserver and champion of Ossabaw Island, died on January 17, 2021, her 108th birthday, at her home in Garden City, Georgia.

Mrs. West and her brothers' children were the last private owners of Ossabaw Island, the 26,000-acre barrier island located at the southern tip of Chatham County, just south of Skidaway and Wassaw Islands.

From 1961 until 1983, Mrs. West operated several innovate interdisciplinary programs on Ossabaw and hosted thousands of people for creative, scientific and historical projects. In 1978, the Torrey-West family, led by Mrs. West, sold Ossabaw to the State of Georgia for its preservation and establishment as Georgia's first Heritage Preserve.

As part of that sale, the state agreed to preserve it in perpetuity, and that its uses only be natural, scientific or cultural education, research or study. Mrs. West continued to

live on Ossabaw Island, becoming a full-time resident in 1987.

Until 2016, she lived in the family home

She was a big supporter of the pool." "Julie" was born in New York and married Kodak executive, Andreas Rittmeyer, in 1962. They had two sons - Chris (Miriam), a pediatric gastroenterologist, and Rob (Pam), soccer director at Rio Rapids Northern

Julie graduated from Rochester Institute of Technology with a BFA and MST. Her life was packed with art, travel, history and politics. She was a quilter, gardener, painter, cook and teacher.

Her dear friend, Jean Wise said, "Julie had a lovely voice and sang in her church choir. She and I drove to Arizona in 2007 stopping at Elvis's boyhood home and the Alamo. We went on to Scottsdale to visit my sister and family. Then San Antonio. So glad we went! So glad to be home!"

Neighbor Carolyn Tucker said, "There is a warm spot in Bill's and my hearts for Julie. Our daughter hoped to attend Savannah Arts Academy, but needed a portfolio. Julie worked with her on sketches, paintings, baskets, and tie dye to build her portfolio. She was accepted and graduated. Thank you, Julie!"

Another neighbor, Selma Bernard, said "All of us suffered a great loss with her passing. She made a great contribution to the community and was a good neighbor."

Kelli Mills, said, "Julie was part of our neighborhood watch and a wonderful asset to Isle

of Hope. We will miss her greatly." Julie was president of the Wymberley Garden Club from 2011-2015. She also managed charitable work - voter registration, literacy, battered women and hospital work.

She lived in Newark, Buffalo, Rochester, Zurich, Paris, London and lastly Savannah.

Retired nurse Mary Blaney said, "Scott and I moved to Wymberley to be near our family and the community spirit. Ms. Julie delivered cookies on our first Christmas. She gave puzzles and crafts to my eight grandchildren.

Scott loved her home-cooking at the Wymberley Garden Club supper for the Isle of Hope Fire Department. She tried to recruit me into the garden club, but with so many "Grandma" duties, I couldn't. She was a fine example of IOH community spirit!"

Julie' paintings and stunning quilts can be

now known as the Torrey-West Estate, that was left to her as a life estate by her mother in 1959. Mrs. West embodied the spirit of Ossabaw Island.

She was always eager to share that spirit, and her island, so that people could reconnect with the natural world, and with each other, in important and powerful ways. Her enthusiasm, joyful spirit, and her love of the experience of Ossabaw inspired thousands of people over her long and fruitful life.

"It is hard to imagine that the death of someone at age 108 is surprising, but we are in shock over the loss of our visionary and friend," said Elizabeth DuBose, Executive Director of the non-profit Ossabaw Island Foundation (TOIF).

Since 1998, TOIF has served as the steward of Ossabaw Island, managing programming and restoring and using historic buildings on the island in accordance with the Heritage Preserve designations of the island, through a use agreement with the State of Georgia's Department of Natural Resources.

"Ossabaw Island, as we know it, exists because of Mrs. West, and Georgia is a better

place because of her life's work. We extend our deepest condolences to Mrs. West's children, grandchildren, many other relatives, and legions of close friends."

"It was Mrs. West's vision, determination, sensitivity, and generosity that made the island's preservation possible, all to the benefit of the State of Georgia, the public, the arts and sciences, the environment-all of us," said TOIF Board Chair M. Tyus Butler, Jr.

"God speed, Sandy. What a wonderful life! You are already sorely missed."

In the 1978 sale of Ossabaw Island to the State of Georgia, the 23 acres known as the Torrey West Estate was purchased along with the rest of the island, but was set aside for Mrs. West's personal use and management, in continuation of the life estate originally granted to her in 1959 in her mother's will.

At Mrs. West's death on January 17, 2021, the Torrey West Estate immediately became part of the Ossabaw Island Heritage Preserve and is now under the management of the Georgia Department of Natural Resources and TOIF.

The defined uses in the Heritage Preserve requiring that all activities on Ossabaw Island befor "natural, scientific and cultural education, research and study" now apply to the Torrey West Estate; during Mrs. West's life this property was exempt from those defined uses.

The Torrey West Estate is now part of the use agreement between TOIF and the State of Georgia, meaning that TOIF is coordinating and leading the management of the property, in the same way that TOIF provides access and use to the northern half of Ossabaw Island.

Mrs. West's family has been granted time to visit the house,



Club, a plaque with her name Dr. Chris said, "She was quirky, questioning, vibrant, bon-vivant and lived life full of creativity and gusto!"









Reversing Math Learning Loss for a COVID Generation

It goes without saying that the pandemic has disrupted every aspect of our lives from the way we live, to how we interact, to the way we work and play. And as most parents of school-aged kids are well aware, it has also greatly impacted our children's education.

How students learn and teachers teach have changed dramatically since COVID emerged around the globe.
