to disband the First Responders program.

However, the fire department will still respond to car wrecks, boat fires, bicycle/golf cart accidents, and anytime needs their assistance. daytime on-duty firefighter may also respond to medical calls if available. So do not fear; we are still well-protected and served by our IOHVFD.

Unfortunately, our current volunteer firefighters are aging, department needs younger volunteers to carry on this vital service.

I'll admit to knowing very little about the requirements to be a firefighter. Hollywood depictions of massive structure fires, trapped fighters, and the buddy that always carries his partner out at the last minute have shaped my perceptions. While this makes for exciting cinema, those rare occurrences aren't typical of day-today operations for Isle of Hope.

One of our newer volunteers, Tracy Castillo, a Wymberley neighbor of mine and the daughter of Chief Tom Christiansen, explained much about what happens during training and structure fires.

For instance, some trucks carry foam, which is more efficient than water at putting out fires. Firefighters also use thermal imaging cameras that detect heat energy through walls, smoke, and dust to locate victims faster inside a building.

Tracy's grandparents founded the IOFVFD. Her father, uncle, and cousin also volunteer, so community service and firefighting are in her blood. Tracy said, as kids, she and her sisters hid in buildings during the training nights so the volunteers could practice using the cameras. While I was in Tracy's home, I met her husband and their four children, who she homeschools. As we talked, I heard a call come in on the radio that volunteers carry.

While there is always a need for firefighters who gear up and go inside burning structures, the IOVFD is always looking for new volunteers to help support their community. To become a member, you must 1) attend three consecutive months of training and meetings and 2) within one year, obtain your basic or Fire 1 training certificate. The IOHVFD pays for all training, and it takes place in the Monday night training sessions at the fire station.

If you are interested in learning more about becoming a volunteer or want to see what goes on at the station and meet our current firefighters, call 912-355-4403 to plan a Monday night visit.

So, next time you hear the sirens and wonder where the fire trucks are headed, consider serving the Isle of Hope community as a certified Volunteer Firefighter Volunteer.



Deserted for 20 years, termite ridden, roof collapsing, vines choking it and brick mortar around the fireplace had crumbled to powder...it was a dreadful eyesore. #53 Henderson Ave. is now inching back to life. Neighbors watch the progress gradually beginning to show someone cares.

That someone is John Wylly, a talented preservationist, who gets tremendous satisfaction from saving abandoned houses such as this early 1900's structure. His skill comes from restoring 25 forlorn abandoned dwellings over 25 years.

He is the kind of preservationist Isle of Hope welcomes rather than someone hiring a demolition crew and then constructing a McMansion.

After six years in the Navy in the nuclear power program aboard the USS Enterprise, John graduated from Georgia Southern

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
in business administration with a major in finance.

A few of John's favorite restorations are:

- 1716 Chatham Avenue at Tybee a raised cottage built in the 1930s. He moved it to a nearby lot, restored it to its original charm, and was given a coveted award for historic preservation by the Tybee Island Historical Association.
- 1904 Stone Street on the back of Wilmington Island. John bought a 1922 fishing cottage destined for the dumpster and landfill. Thanks to him, today it is being comfortably occupied and enjoyed.
- 2210 Whitaker Street in the Starland District was built in 1890. The city boarded it up and posted the condemned signs. He

began working on it in 2001 his first major project.

Willoughby, president of our Isle of Hope Historical Association, added ... "When an old house sits empty too long, you wonder if its next visitor will be a bulldozer. Someone





2210 Whitaker Street, before restoration took place.


should be happy that John beat the bulldozer to #53 Henderson." The sad old cottage was on seriously borrowed time.

Carson Hucks, who grew up next door at #55 with his parents and five siblings in 545 square feet (yikes!) recalls, "Frank and Mary Mock lived next door in #53. In 1953, Nina and

Sam Porcher bought it and moved in. They tore off the front porch and built the cement porch."

"Sam Porcher was an oiler at Union Bag keeping the machinery greased and lubricated. Nina worked at the Central of

Georgia Railroad and was secretary at the Methodist Church. Sam's son, Charlie,



2210 Whitaker is now beautifully restored.


lived there after Sam died to care for ailing Nina".

Carson recalls, "Our address was Rt. 3, Box 344, Isle of Hope. Didn't need to add Savannah, Ga." He now lives on Rosenbrook Ave.

Carol Jordan, who now lives in #51 Henderson Ave. grew up in #47 Richmond Ave. After living away, she returned in 1991 and bought #51. She is delighted to hear John's happy sounds of restoration! She recalls when Nina was weak and couldn't climb the porch stairs, Garland Wilson, a member of the Baptist Church, recruited pals from his church to build a ramp for her!

Patty Turner lives on the other side in # 55 with her dog Rosie. "I am so excited to see what John is doing with the Porcher house. It's looked terrible in the seven years I've lived here." Yes indeed...very happy sounds!

Tips for Spring Boating Preparation

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Spring has sprung! To make the most of this beautiful boating weather, be sure to prep your boat —as well as your cruising guests— to get the most out of the coming summer's boating fun. Here are some tips to get your season started right.

Spring Boating Preparation Tips

Making sure that you've properly dewinterized the vessel's engine is the first step. If the oil wasn't changed before the boat's winter rest, now is the time to do it. Include a change-out of the oil filter and the transmission fluid when you do. If your boat has an outboard, prepping its oils and inner workings is just as important. Cooling systems should be flushed and the antifreeze replaced with the appropriate water and coolant mixture. Also, check those batteries, and you will likely need to replace them before dropping that hull back into the blue.

Speaking of the hull, be sure to give it a thorough once-over for cracks, blistering, and chipping. Make sure the exterior of the boat is properly cleaned with a safe product. Restoring the boat's gel coat helps to prevent oxidation. You may need to repeat gel coat restoration during the summer, but it's well worth the trouble. Working on preparation during the spring makes any further preventive hull maintenance go more smoothly. Be sure to test every one of your electronics, from radio to depth finder, compass, GPS, and more. Examine your life jackets for wear and tear, quality matters with life jackets. If a jacket needs replacing, make sure they have bright coloring, collar handles, and sturdy strapping.

Above all, be conscientious about requiring that everyone onboard wears one. A boat should never be in the water without enough jackets to outfit everybody. And, too, all fire extinguishers and flares should be checked to assure they're in good operating condition.

Last, but not at all least: Have a float plan and keep a weather eye. Assure that someone who isn't going out with you is informed about all of your primary stops and anchorages, as well as your anticipated time of return. Be on the lookout for weather change-ups while you're boating. You want to have a great time when you're out there. The best way to ensure that is to properly prep your vessel and your guests before the hull even hits the water this spring. Then grab that sunblock, pull out that rod and reel, and drop that swim ladder!

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
