The Isle of Hope Sharks are City Champions once more! The Sharks were crowned champions of the 2023 Savannah Coastal Swim League, which has pitted local swim teams against each other for the title of SAVANNAH'S BEST SWIM TEAM every summer since 1967. Isle of Hope, a charter member of the League, had not won the title in over ten years. This year's win was a razor-thin

upset victory at the Savannah City Meet over an eight-team field that included the seven-time defending champion Savannah Golf Club Stingrays. Discovery Channel has its SHARK WEEK, but it was SHARK DAY on July 1 at the Chatham County Aquatic Center and there were fins circling everywhere!

Summer swim teams are unique sports teams that include both girls and boys One of the perks of living on Isle of Hope is the "Bluff Walk."

This has become a ritual of mine since I got my dog Harper five years ago.

I used to walk the Bluff occasionally, but she forced me to do it everyday. On most days – minus those 105 heat index days when the breeze refuses to blow, and the humidity microwaves me like a bag of steamed veggies – I am grateful.

Some folks choose to drive a car, a cart, or even a bike down the Bluff. I get that. Before I moved back to the island, I would often detour down the "most scenic road" in Savannah if I was nearby. My wife was not always amused with my diversion.

I've found that the slower you move down the Bluff, the more you see, smell, feel, hear and... savor.

My mind grinds away to solve some problem, but then the sun breaks through the Spanish moss hanging from an oak just right. Or the salty smell of the river tickles my nostrils just right, and I wake up. The wheels

stop turning in my head, and I become aware of what is in front of me. I unplug from my "monkey mind" and enter the here and now. I am thankful for the seemingly insignificant stuff that makes me feel alive and that life is worth living.

At times, I will stop and look out over the Skidaway River as the tide climbs or falls and notice how the river bends in the distance. Or how the flickering, flowing river kisses the marsh. I feel


IOH Garden Tour Features 10 Delightful Gardens

This year's Isle of Hope team had 123 Sharks from 64 families. To steal a line from JAWS, "We are going to need a bigger pool."


The Isle of Hope pool an important has been community hub just as Willie and Rose Barbee hoped when they donated the park land to the old Isle of Hope Community Club in 1946. The pool was opened in 1965 and the swim team formed with the help of Isle of Hope families including the Tisons, Christiansens, Solanas, Pierces, Clements, Sowells, Shaws, Shumans, Espys, and Filsons.

The seven children in the Filson family could almost fill two relays by themselves. Over the vears, different families carried the Shark banner and won championships, including the Hughes, Quattlebaums, Fogartys, Miltiades, Newkirks, Bakers, Flanders, Sellers, Franklins, Jensens, Peaglers, Olivers, Biggerstaffs, and Artleys. The Sharks are now in their third generation of swimmers.

Six legacy families on this year's team, the Bernards, Bourbons, Cawthons, Longs, Martins, and Tylers, have parents and children who swam on the Sharks. The Christiansen/Castillo family has grandparents,

The Economic Impact of the Hyundai Plant on the Savannah and Georgia Real Estate Market

The increased population in Ellabell and surrounding areas will necessitate infrastructure development to accommodate the growing

demand. The growth could result in the development of new housing projects, schools, shopping centers, and other amenities, contributing to the overall expansion and development of the region.

Real Estate Investment Opportunities:



A review of the current Savannah City Meet records shows many Shark record holders who went on to greater swimming glory, including Toni Paruso (who later swam for the US Naval Academy), Sam Parker (who currently swims for the University Georgia), of Brennan Pastorek (who later swam for Stanford University), Seymour Aaron (who currently swims for the University of Georgia), Darby Wayner (who later swam for University of Utah) and Alex Wayner

(who currently swims for Ohio University). No doubt, some current Sharks will be future record holders and NCAA swimmers!


This year's City Championship was not an overnight success. Practice started at the beginning of April shortly after the Sharks' "JOIN NOW!" roadside signs appeared on the causeway.

The first few weeks of practices were in the frigid waters of the Chatham County Aquatic Center before the Isle of Hope pool was opened. By May, the Sharks quit shivering and were working out daily, sometimes twice daily, in the warm waters of the Isle of Hope pool.

Every day, the Sharks practiced streamlining, turning, flip breath control, block starts, and championship finishes. They kicked on their fronts, backs, left sides, right sides until they were dizzy. Daily diving drills progressed from pencil dives to side-slappers to knee-raisers to starfish jumps to rainbow dives to splashless entries that defied physics.

Each week was highlighted by a Saturday morning practice that ended with the Sharks devouring dozens of BAKER'S PRIDE donuts, the BIGGEST, BEST DONUTS

in the world. Sugar makes speedy Sharks.

This season included opportunities for Sharks to earn rewards for milestone performances. Older Sharks who swam a mile without stopping - 66 laps all with flip turns - earned their own "MILER SMILER" towels. Younger Sharks "SEMI earned **MILER** SMILER" towels for 33 laps (7-9 year-olds) or 16 laps (6 year-old and younger). Over 100 Sharks earned towels, including 5-yearold Joaquin "Spiderman" Castillo. Sharks with supersized lungs who swam a complete lap underwater in streamline position using only a dolphin kick were "UNDERWATER dubbed WONDERS" and earned a water bottle. Over 30 Sharks met that challenge, including 8-year-olds Ruth Castillo (Spiderman's sister) and Owen DeLoach.


You would think they had gills. Sharks who completed 50 consecutive flip turns earned "TURNER BURNER" buttons. Sharks who met the qualifying times for the City Meet earned Shark-shaped key chains. No team had more swimmers qualify for the City Meet this year than the Isle of Hope Sharks.

There were five dual meets in the regular season and then the championship City Meet. The Sharks FIN-ished their

dual meet schedule with an undefeated 5-0 record. In the first four meets, they outpointed the Savannah Yacht Club Commodores 299-131, the Savannah Quarters Sailfish 299-156, the Horizon Hurricanes 311-55, and the Landings Lightning Bolts, 322-68.

That set up the head-tohead showdown with the unbeaten Savannah Golf Club Sting Rays, who could not remember their last loss. The Golf Club pool quickly became SHARK-INFESTED WATERS and those Stingray skates were no match for the hungry Sharks. In the very first event, the 6 and under girls 25-yard freestyle, 10 different Sharks, led by Pevton Hunt and Charlotte Bourbon, beat the fastest Stingray swimmer. With that 1-10 SWEEP, the Sharks never looked back (Sharks do not have necks) and went on to win 251-219. Afterwards, we had a pool party celebration, complete with cannonballs, in the deep end of the Golf Club pool to the theme music from JAWS.

The Golf Club hoped to avenge their dual meet loss at the City Meet. That meet includes all 8 teams and hundreds of swimmers. Points are awarded for the first 16 places in 64 different events. Literally 10,000 points are up for grabs. Last year at the City Meet, the Golf Club extended



their winning streak and beat the Sharks by over 1,000 points -- 2,344-1,221. Not this year.

After a full day of swimming, with school after school of Sharks swimming their hearts out, Isle of Hope had eked out a 17-point victory - 2,138-2,121. In a 10,000-point meet, 17 points can be lost in a heartbeat when a 6-year-old's goggles fill with water or a 9-yearold slips on a wet starting block. Happily, our goggles were tight and our blocks were dry.

It was a TOTAL TEAM VICTORY and there were highlights. Seven Sharks won City Championships in individual events. (Peyton Hunt, Merrick Bourbon, Owen DeLoach, Grant Adams, Ethan Zimmerman, Rhett McCarthy, and Emily Semones).

Nineteen Sharks won City Championships as members of first place

more than grateful to be where I am with no care in the world... if only for a little while.


Then Harps sees a squirrel and jerks me out of my reverie.




